



Lake Comedero - Mexico

A Trip to Remember



12 of us just returned from Lake Comedero, and I have a new favorite lake. This 28,000 acre lake saw just 8 sport fishing boats a day. Much like PWF properties, you have total solitude; as you feel like you have the whole lake to yourself.

We left Dallas Friday morning at 10:40 AM, and arrived at the tiny village just 5 minutes from Lake Comedero late that same afternoon. It is so nice to have a 2.5 hour direct flight. Once we arrived at camp we were greeted by local children, chickens, and donkeys all playing in the dirt road just outside our accommodations.

Up at 5:00 AM, and on the water by 6:00 AM and ready for the 10 to 15 min boat ride to our guide's favorite spot. We fish until noon and come in for lunch, heading back out from 2:00 pm to dusk. You rinse and repeat this process for the next 3 days.

Catch rates varied between anglers, with some catching 20 a day and some catching 75 a day. All total, we had 31 fish over 7 lbs (including two 8's and one 9). We estimate we caught more than 150 fish over 5 lbs. My fishing partner had a 34 lb sack (best 5 fish) on day 1. My personal best day came on day 2, with a sack of 36 lbs and more than 25 fish over 5 lbs.

The type of fishing was power fishing. The anglers who caught the bigger fish spent most of their time pitching just a few feet, in the most dense cover imaginable, with 1 oz jigs. You free spool the jig to the bottom and wait for the thud. No thud, reel up and pitch 5 feet to the right. Wait for the thud. No thud, do it again. In most cases we were using 65 to 80 lb braid and having to horse the fish out of the brush. However, fish were caught on top waters, spinnerbaits, Texas rigs, and even a few on crank baits. But, the best success was horsing them out of the brush. I love it!!!



I have already booked a 3 day trip (\$1795) and a 4 day trip (\$1995) for late January 2018. For many, 3 days is plenty of fishing. For others, 4 days is just about right. For those who love Picachos and El Salto, we have a group trip planned in May of 2018. For those of you who don't know about any of these lakes, give me a call and I can tell you the pros and cons of each lake. I end each of these invites with the
